



# The Sacrament of Baptism

#### INTRODUCTION OF CANDIDATE

Dear friends, as we come to this font of living water, let us recall the meaning of baptism: you are no longer a stranger and sojourner, but you are equally a citizen

with the saints and all members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets with Christ Jesus, Love's Own Self, being the cornerstone, in whom the whole structure is joined together — and in whom you, also, have become a dwelling place for the Spirit of God.

For just as the body is one, and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one, so it is with Christ. By water and by one Spirit we were all baptized into one church--the body of Christ. As we live with Christ and with Christ's people, we grow in faith and love.

## LITANY OF BAPTISM

We are gathered to present this companion to the church and to dedicate him to God. What can we affirm about him?

That he is a child of God and made in the image of God.

How will he know that he is a child of God, made in God's image?

We will welcome him, recognize God in him, and treasure each shared moment as a gift of the Holy Spirit.

How will he, and we, remember and learn of the Christian faith?

Through faithful teaching and the example of our lives.

We will tell of Abraham and Sarah, parents of multitudes;

of Moses and Miriam who led our ancestors out of bondage;

of Ruth's faithfulness:

of the Jewish hope for a messiah;

of Mary and Joseph's openness to mystery;

of Jesus, the heart of the universe;

and of the history of the Church as the Body of Christ, seeking always to live in God's shalom.

#### INVITATION

## RESPONSIVE THANKSGIVING

One: God be with you.

Many: And also with you.

Lift up your hearts!

We lift them to God.

O God, we thank you for the rich blessing of your Creation, and come to offer our whole selves as you call us to live for your realm of *shalom*.

#### **BLESSING THE ELEMENTS**

Christ invites everyone to eat the bread of life, to drink the cup of the new covenant.

On the night of his arrest Jesus took bread, and after giving thanks to God, broke it and said, This is my body which is for you; do this remembering me.

And so we breathe out hope as we proclaim the mystery of faith:

As we share this food and drink, may we become, for each other, the hope that Jesus has awakened in us. ## SHARING THE MEAL

We celebrate an open communion and welcome every person to the table. We understand the sharing of the bread and the cup in Jesus' name to be a reenactment of an ancient vision of God's feast for all people. We don't require you to be a member of our church, or any church, to participate with us in this feast of grace: all that is needed is that you desire God's nurture. (We use gluten-free bread and unfermented grape juice in an effort to remove barriers to anyone's participation in the sacrament.)

ONE: Eternal and gracious One, though we live in a world of need,

ALL: here we have tasted your goodness

and been fed by your vision of fullness of life for all creation.

Though afflicted by brokenness and division,


here we have heard again your call to live as a Beloved Community.
